## Talk 6

Academic Publishing: Navigating Expectations and Ethics in a Post-Disciplinary World

### **Synopsis**

In recent years, the higher education landscape of research and publishing has become increasingly globalized, as the leadership of the west is challenged by scholars from the east and south. Citation indices, university rankings, and publish or perish policies are driving more academics than ever before to compete for limited page space in reputable journals. As a result, the number of academic journals has proliferated and the validity of submitted research papers has come under greater scrutiny. This presentation will describe today's academic publishing challenges, the ethical dilemmas that editors and publishers encounter, and how to become a successful and respected scholar in today's world.

Dr. Lew has held two Fulbright positions, in Singapore (1983-4) and Malaysia (Spring 2012), and has been a visiting lecturer at the University of Tübingen, Germany (1989) and at the National University of Singapore (1997-8 and Spring 2008). He is currently a Research Associate at the University of Technology Malaysia, a Concurrent Professor at Nanjing University, and an External Examiner at the Chinese University of Hong Kong. He often collaborates with international colleagues to organize conferences, including in China (2001, 2003, 2005, 2007, 2009, 2011 and 2013), Martinique (2011), Hong Kong (2012 and 2013) and Malaysia (2013).

His research interests focus on tourism in the Asia-Pacific region, particularly in Southeast Asia and China, with topics covering community tourism planning, tourist movements, sustainable tourism, heritage tourism, tourism geography.

Professor Lew has authored close to 70 articles and book chapters and has written and edited several books, including Tourism in China (1995 and 2003), Sustainable Tourism: A Geographical Perspective (1998), Tourism and Gaming on American Indian Lands (1998), Companion to Tourism (2004), Seductions of Place (2005), Understanding and Managing Tourism Impacts: An Integrated Approach (2009), and World Regional Geography: Human Mobilities, Tourism Destinations, Sustainable Environments (2011), among others. He is the founding editor-in-chief of the ISI/SSCI listed journal, Tourism Geographies (since 1999), serves on the editorial boards of 13 other journals, and has served in leadership positions for the Tourism Commission of the International Geographical Union (IGU) and the Recreation, Tourism and Sport (RTS) specialty group of the Association of American Geographers (AAG).
